#### **Budget Prioritization and Justification**

The Maricopa Police Department is requesting a full-time Victim Advocate for the Courts. This position is vital in expanding the Maricopa Victim Assistance Program (MVAP). It provides the critical link to the court systems within the County and State that can be intimidating to victims. The VCourt Advocate will assist the victims throughout the criminal justice process to provide notifications of judicial proceedings, compensation claims, completing the appropriate legal paperwork, provide support and other aspects of the criminal justice system. Over the last two years, MVAP has seen a huge increase in the number of court contacts (2014 – 7: 2015 – 222). The 3,071% increase in court contacts is a direct result of MPD receiving grants through the Arizona Criminal Justice Commission (ACJC) and Victims of Crime Act (VOCA). It started with a part-time advocate funded through ACJC and has evolved to a full-time position partially funded with ACJC and VOCA funding. Having a FTE to provide these services is crucial to the success of the program. The numbers support this statement as 222 court contacts in 2015 when the position was 100% (ACJC and VOCA funded). Only 7 when the position was a part-time position. The request for one FTE would be a catalyst for MPD to serve even more victims in the future and dedicate resources to not only serve the victims in the court systems, but enable MPD to assist other victims by leveraging the ACJC grant to hire a part-time advocate. The combination of the two positions would provide additional coverage to the City of Maricopa which has seen its population grow from 1,040 in 2000 to over 43,482 in the 2010 census. The growth experienced compounds the igaps in providing services to

victims in Maricopa due to resource constraints. In 2015, MPD received 500 domestic violence calls for service with one murder-suicide, 82 sex offenses and 15 SANE exams completed. VOCA funding would greatly assist the City meet its ever growing needs to provide crucial services to those victims. Without the additional resources, the victims could be further traumatized and re-victimized due to the City not being provide the services and ongoing emotional support they so desperately need and seek. The Victim Advocate for the Court position is the number one priority for this funding request. It is a critical resource that the victims within the City desperately need to ensure they are not revictimized again and can begin the healing journey.

The priority of this request is the funding of a FTE Victim Advocate for the Courts. The second priority is to provide that person with additional training. Training is an essential piece of ensuring the victims within the City and surrounding community that come to MVAP for assistance receive the best service possible. MPD is proposing to have the Victim Advocate and either the Community Programs Manager or volunteer(s) attend three trainings throughout the year. These trainings are the Pinal County Resource Roundup 2017, the Pinal County Domestic Violence Conference, and the Arizona Victim Assistance Academy. Each of the trainings proposed give our MVAP team and the Victim Advocate - Court the ability to network, listen to experts, and attend workshops to learn about new/innovative/best practices within various fields affecting victim assistance. These areas include children, senior, and veteran services; behavioral health; housing assistance; and what resources are available to help assist victims. The power of networking at these events is often overlooked, but MPD sees the benefit of having our advocate and the MVAP team network with others within the State. Not only can these individuals be a great informational resource for MVAP, but they may be individuals that can provide additional direct services not currently offered by MVAP that would improve our assistance to victims. The third priority would be the National Organization of Victim Assistance (NOVA) premier membership, the Arizona Coalition for Victim Services, and Arizona Coalition to End Sexual and Domestic Violence memberships. The memberships provide additional training opportunities through the NOVA national network, additional networking opportunities (online and in-person), and additional resources that can help the victim advocate for the court instill best practices and stay current with the national and state trends. The fourth priority is supplies (office and computer). These supplies include printer ink for the VOCA printers, paper for printers, staples, paperclips, folders, and other office supplies that are needed throughout the year. The Victim Advocate – Court have dedicated printers at the City Court House and within the MPD station that they utilize to print off legal documents, forms, and resource materials to give to victims as they assist them. Besides the normal office supplies, MPD intends to utilize some of the funding in this line item to purchase additional materials (books, guides, etc.) to give to victims to help them through the process. For example, one book that is being considered is "Family and Friends Guide to Domestic Violence". The fifth priority is supplies (victim waiting room and child area). These supplies will assist in making the victim assistance process more comfortable and inviting to victims especially ones with children. Often times, the assistance process can take awhile to complete. During this time, the children and often times the victims need a distraction or something to keep them occupied. The supplies we are requesting would help enable them to do so. MPD is looking to purchase coloring books, crayons, children toys, and games to give the victims and their families items to help pass the time and make the process as easy on them as possible. The last priority would be cover the cost of printing additional collateral and educational materials to hand out to victims when they seek assistance, but also at community events and to have out at the City buildings. The cost would also cover the brochure holders that are placed in various locations within the City to make it easier for victims to obtain the materials. The additional resources provided as supplies, training, printing, and membership will assist MPD in meeting the growing needs of the community with dedicated staff and volunteers. This position is necessary to aid those victims and their families get the assistance and support they need throughout the criminal justice process.

The 20% match is being met through the ACJC grant that funds a part-time Law Enforcement or Crisis Response Advocate position at MPD. The total ACJC grant is for \$25,052 and runs from 7/1/2016 to 6/30/2017. Due to this position being vacant for a month, the funds will be expended at a higher rate throughout the remaining period on the grant. This enables MPD to meet the full match (\$19,343) through this position and by 6/30/17.

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
